7. Recognition

Institutions commit to:

Ensure recognition for activities satisfactorily completed.

Med Uni Graz:

- Upon successful completion of the student mobility, incoming students are awarded a Traineeship Certificate
- Upon successful completion of the staff mobility, incoming staff are awarded a Confirmation of Attendance
- Upon successful completion of the student mobility, outgoing students are awarded 1,5 ECTS per week of clinical rotation completed abroad
- Upon successful completion of the student mobility, outgoing students are awarded ECTS credits according to the curriculum for parts of their Clinical Practical Year (CPY) completed abroad

Chiang Mai University:

- Upon successful completion of the student mobility, incoming students are awarded a Traineeship Certificate
- Upon successful completion of the staff mobility, incoming staff are awarded a Confirmation of Attendance
- Ensure that student and staff mobility for education or training purposes is based on a learning agreement for students and a mobility agreement for staff validated in advance between the sending and receiving institutions and the mobile participants.

- Accept all activities indicated in the learning agreement, or according to the learning outcomes of the modules completed abroad, as automatically counting towards the degree, provided these have been satisfactorily completed by the mobile student.
- Partners commit to taking measures to ensure recognition of student and staff mobility upon their return, including:
- Providing incoming mobile students and their sending institutions with free-of-charge transcripts. The documents must be in English or in the language of the sending institution and containing a full, accurate and timely record of the achievements at the end of the mobility
